

TO MY BELOVED PEOPLE

Catholicism is the pursuit of Truth, and human beings gain a greater participation in truth through distinctions. Inasmuch as things are the same, they are also different. For example, we have the same desire for happiness, the necessity to eat, and we will all die; but we also are each unique, some enjoy rodeos, others not so much. There is a huge difference between fruits and gifts. Fruits must be cultivated and are thus products of particular actions. Gifts, on the other hand, are given freely by God and are not merited. The Gifts of the Holy Spirit are:

- **Wisdom** is the knowledge of and judgment about "divine things" and the ability to judge and direct human affairs according to divine truth.
- **Understanding** is penetrating insight into the very heart of things, especially those higher truths that are necessary for our eternal salvation in effect, the ability to "see" Jesus as the way, the truth, and the life.
- Counsel allows a man to be directed by God in matters necessary for his salvation
- Fortitude denotes a firmness of mind in doing good and in avoiding evil.
- **Knowledge** is the ability to judge correctly about matters of faith and right action, so as to never wander from the straight path of justice.
- Piety is reverence of and the act of worshipping God.
- Fear of God allows us to avoid separating ourselves from God.

The Fruits of the Holy Spirit are much different – kindness, generosity, joy, charity, self-control, faithfulness, modesty, patience, peace, chastity, goodness, and gentleness. Pray for the former, cultivate the latter!

MEDITATION

IMITATION OF CHRIST

Jesus has many lovers of His heavenly kingdom, but few cross-bearers. Many desire His consolation, but few His tribulation. Many will sit down with Him at table, but few will share His fast. All desire to rejoice with Him, but few will suffer for Him. Many will follow Him to the breaking of the bread, but few will drink the bitter cup of His Passion. Many revere His miracles, but few follow the shame of His cross. Many love Jesus when all goes well with them, and praise Him when He does them a favor; but if Jesus conceals Himself and leaves them for a little while, they fall to complaining or become depressed. They who love Jesus purely for Himself and not for their own sake bless Him in all trouble and anguish as well as in time of consolation. Even if He never sent them consolation, they would still praise Him and give thanks. Oh, how powerful is the pure love of Jesus, when not mixed with self-interest or self-love!

BEARING FRUIT

This Sunday's Gospel presents us with the beautiful metaphor of the vine and the branches. Jesus emphasizes the importance of remaining in Him to bear fruit. Like branches that cannot survive, let alone bear fruit when severed from the vine, our spiritual lives wither without a deep and sustaining connection to Christ. This imagery invites us to consider the nature of the fruit we're called to bear. It's not merely about individual accomplishments but about contributing to the flourishing of the whole community, to the glory of God. Bearing fruit requires trust and drawing strength from the Lord. It involves pruning – letting go of what hinders our growth and embracing a process of spiritual refinement. This is not always comfortable, but it is necessary for growth. We are reminded that our efforts, grounded in faith and sustained by grace, can lead to abundant life for ourselves and for others.

As we reflect on the readings for the Fifth Sunday of Easter, we are called to embrace boldness in our proclamation and living of the Gospel, to foster communities grounded in love and service, and to bear fruit that brings glory to God. Let us draw strength from our connection to Christ, the true vine, trusting that He will guide and sustain us in our journey. Just as the early Christians' boldness in faith and action played a pivotal role in the growth of the Church, so too are we called to be instruments of God's love and grace in the world today.
